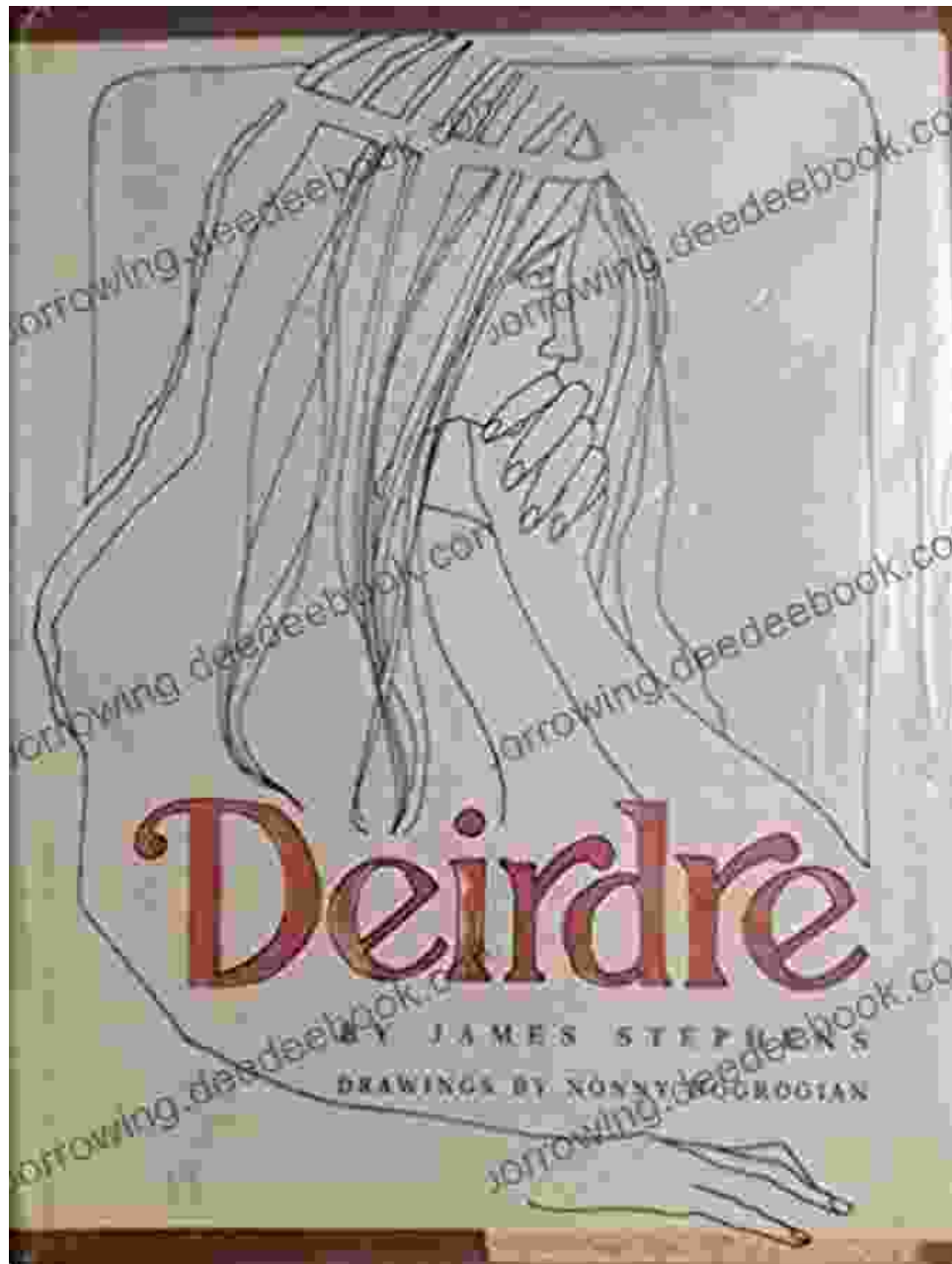

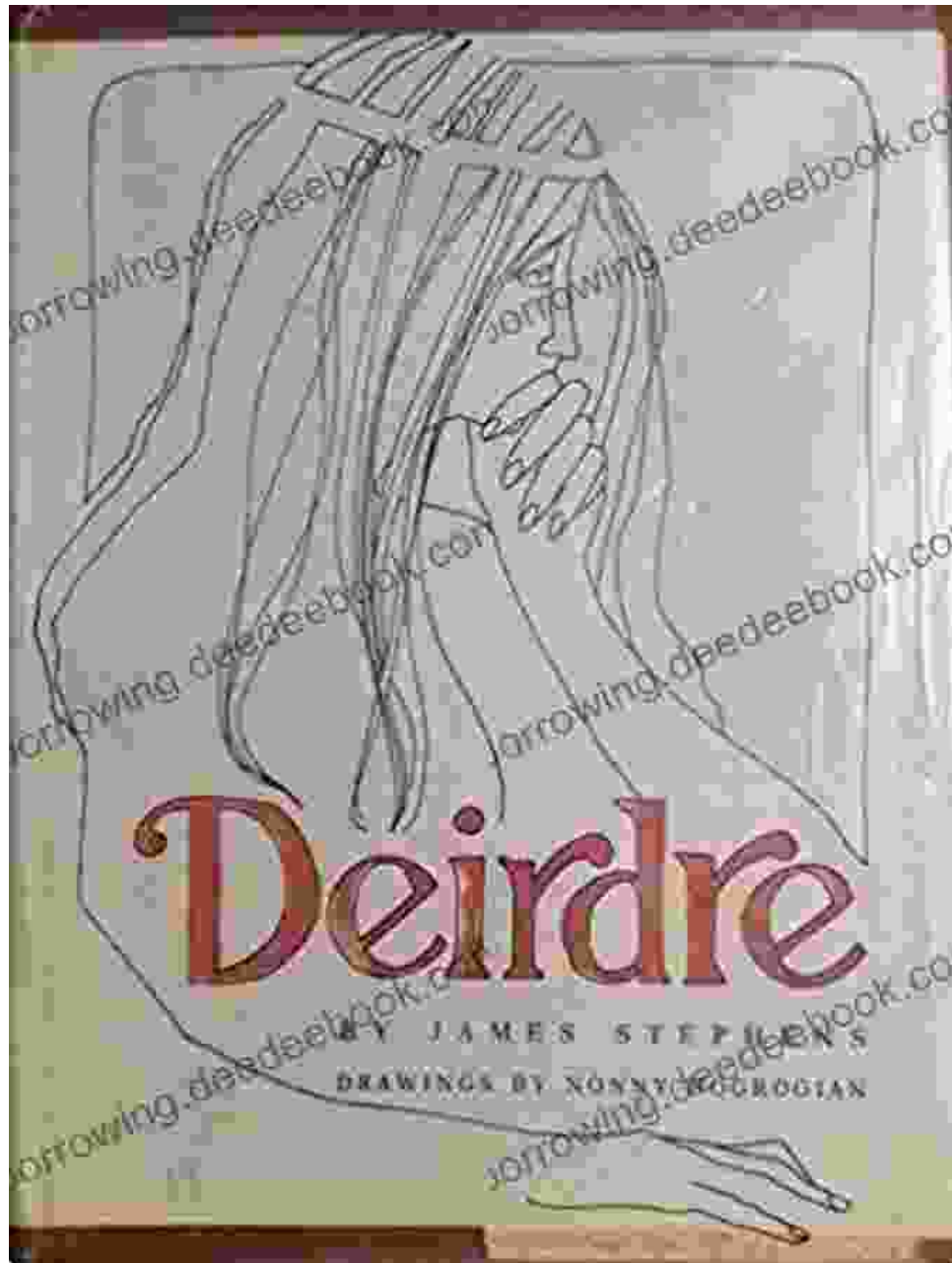

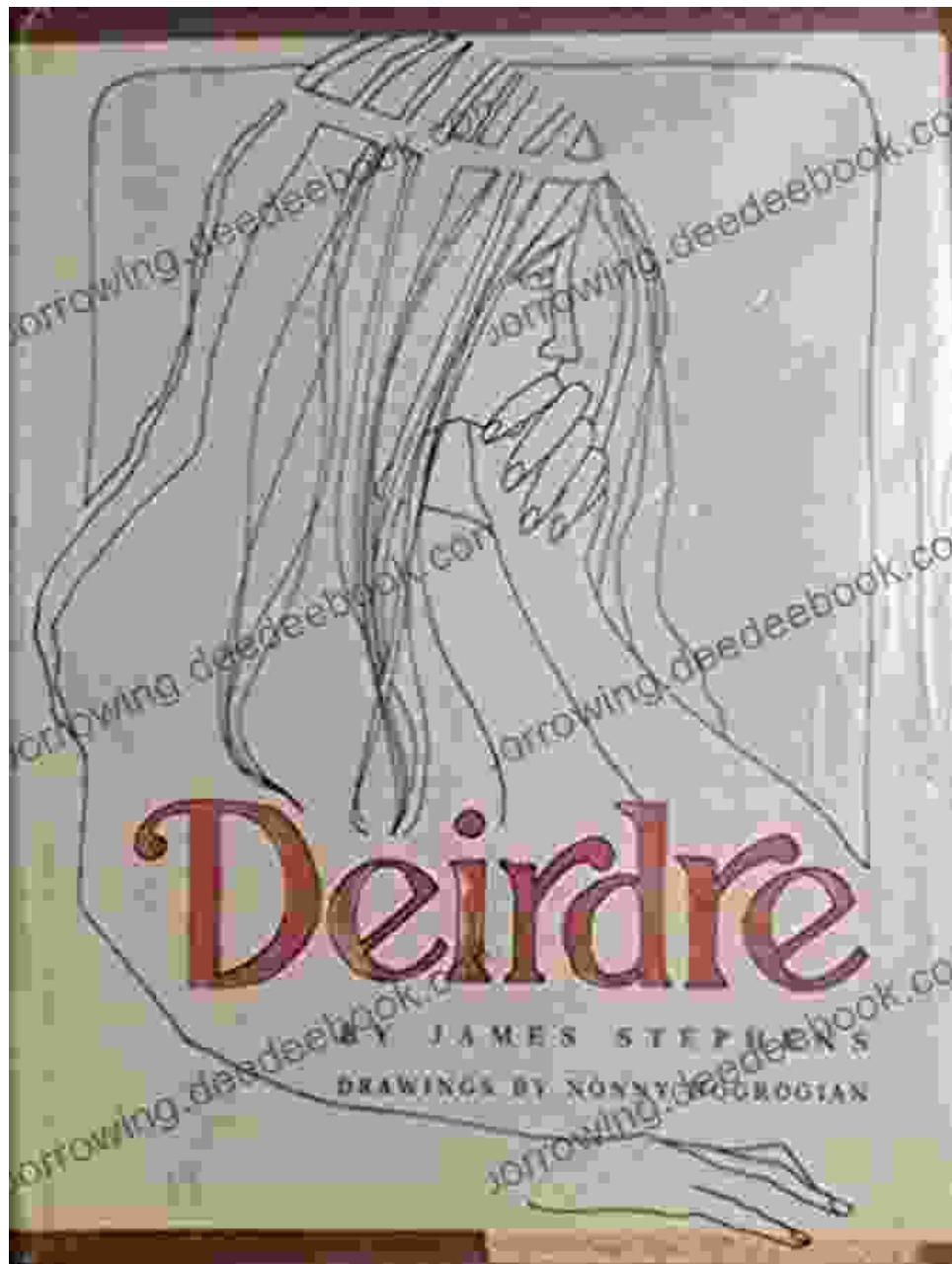
The Workshop Theatre and Artistic Breakthrough

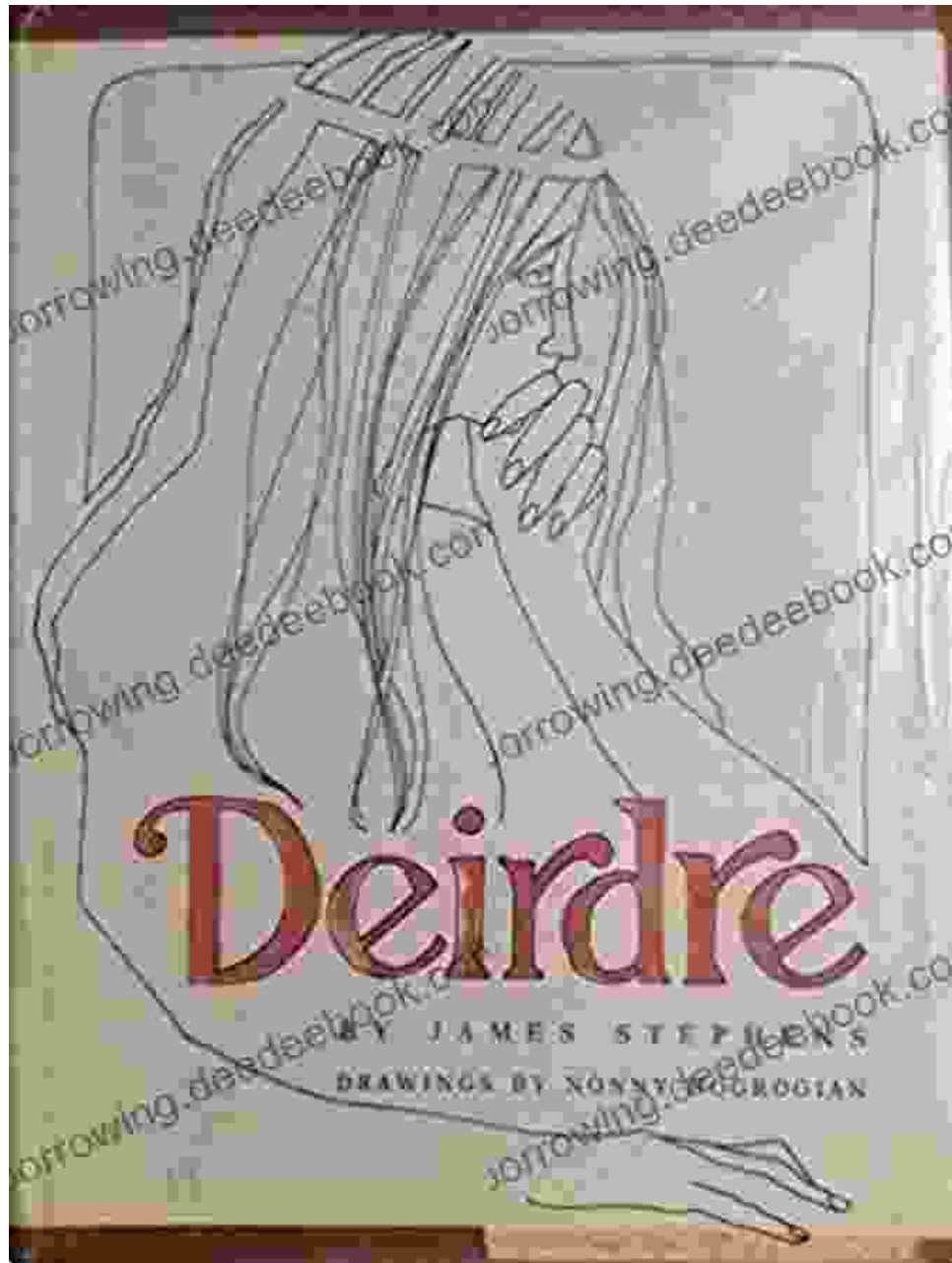


Deirdre James Stephens using her voice to advocate for social justice and human rights.
